The club Christmas Party will be on the 30th November – further details will be provided soon.


The annual closure of the lawns for maintenance will be from Monday December 8th to Sunday December 28th.

Tournaments

There has been a feast of tournaments this month, with many of them featuring Cammeray players. James Carlisle has had a highly successful month, entering three tournaments and winning every game in each one – a run of 26 successive victories!

The President's Eights





The President's Eights is an Australia-wide competition where 24 of the top players are divided into three blocks who each play a double round-robin. Cammeray had members in each block: Peter Landrebe was in a very strong top block and performed creditably. In the second block James Carlisle swept everyone aside, winning all fourteen games. In the third block Joanne Brown started slowly, losing to two lower-ranked players, but then picked up her game and won all the remaining 11 games. That left her on the same score at Colin Clark of Victoria, but Joanne lost the play-off to come second.

Cammeray Tournaments

The Cammeray Handicap had six entries; James Carlise won all his games, while Michael Strickland with three wins came second on hoop count from Rob Barrie and Andrew Stark. Andrew's performance was an excellent one as he has only just finished his beginner training.

The Cammeray Open had 8 entries: James Carlisle was first with seven wins, followed by Rob Elliott with 6 and Alan Walsh with 5.

The World AC Championship

The world championships were held in Florida this year. Robert Fletcher of Australia was the favourite to win, and in the knockout stage he won ten straight games, nine of them with triple peels – but then, having won the first two games of a best-of-five match against Mark Avery in the semi-final, he then lost the next three games. In the final the South African Reg Bamford beat Mark Avery with three successive triple peels – 26tp-19, 26tp-0, 26tp-0.

The World AC Ranking System

Croquet players will all be familiar with the handicap system in AC and GC, where one's handicap moves up or down depending on wins and losses against other players. The index from which the handicap is determined moves up if you win a game, and down if you lose – and the amount of movement depends on the difference in handicap between the players.

The world ranking system is completely separate from the handicap system, though it operates on a similar principle. For a start, only major tournaments are counted – no handicap tournaments, no tournaments limited to club members, no tournaments with a specified handicap range (such as silver or gold).

In order to be included in the rankings, you have to play a minimum of twelve games in the past year in eligible tournaments. If you do not, you do not appear in the rankings – though when you do play twelve games in a year, your ranking resumes at its previous level.

As in the handicap system, your index moves up or down depending on whether you win or lose, and by an amount based on the different in index.
